"When I first met Jenny, she was eight years old, it was clear she was desperate to learn.

She wanted to answer the questions her teacher asked her. She wanted to fit in.

The problem was simple: she couldn't.

In class, she couldn't read very well and often she wasn't even sure if she understood what she was supposed to do. She'd just sit in class silently, trying to avoid being asked questions. Jenny built a wall around herself, retreating from classmates and falling further and further behind at school.

Unfortunately, Jenny's story isn't unique; I work with children just like her every day.

Approximately 1 in 10 Australian children are living in disadvantage. They start their education without the early literacy and numeracy skills of their classmates. They are behind before they even begin.

For children like Jenny, school simply gets harder and harder. They feel embarrassed because they can't read well, they struggle to complete their homework for the same reasons. Disappointment turns into disillusionment. Without the out-ofschool support which The Smith Family provides, these students will never dare to dream big, and never strive to overcome the educational obstacles in their path.

When Jenny started in our *Learning* for Life program, I was able to give Jenny and her family the extra support they needed. She was dedicated and keen.

With each hurdle she overcame, her confidence grew, and now, she may not be top of the class, but she's right up there – answering questions and feeling confident in her abilities. This is where real change begins.

I see her beginning to enjoy school and I know she will reach her full potential."

These kids don't have the confidence in their own abilities, that they're in the right place and that people will help them.

Education has enabled us to emigrate (twice) and to create successful lives in different countries. We want that for all Australian kids. "Our mum, Joan (pictured above with our dad John), trained as a nurse at RPA (Royal Prince Alfred Hospital in Sydney) and spent much of her working life in the palliative care ward at Greenwich Hospital.

She met dad, John, on a boat to Australia in 1951 when he was emigrating as a '10 pound Pom'. Dad worked as an engineer and always felt that Australia provided him and his family, with so many opportunities. Mum and dad decided early on that they would like to make an ongoing contribution to The Smith Family.

When mum and dad told us, about 10 years ago, that they were including The Smith Family in their Will, it wasn't a shock at all. It actually felt good to know that they were

When you think about leaving a gift to The Smith Family in your Will, you are making a decision which will help future generations of Australian children. Your gift will give them the support they need to get the most out of their education and change their lives.

Step 1: Decide what kind of gift to leave

There are different kinds of gifts you can leave in your Will, however many of our supporters choose to leave a monetary gift in the form of a residuary bequest.

Other options include a specified amount of money or an asset, for example real estate, shares, bonds or an item of value.

Step 2: Speak to family and loved ones

Let them know of your intentions to leave a gift to The Smith Family and ensure they support your decision.

Step 3: Seek professional advice

Your Will is an important legal document that must be properly prepared. Ask your solicitor or Trustee Company about the best way to do this and the most appropriate gift for your circumstances.

Step 4: Making a Will

To include your chosen gift to The Smith Family when you write your Will, provide your solicitor with the following wording: "I (insert name here) bequeath to The Smith Family ABN 28 000 030 179 (insert the percentage or residue of your estate, the amount of money, or the details of your property, shares, bonds or item of value).

My bequest is to be used for the general purposes of The Smith Family.

I declare that the receipt of the Secretary or other proper officer shall be a complete discharge of my bequest."

Step 5: Amending a Will

If you have already written your Will, the easiest way to make a gift to The Smith Family is by adding a codicil – a short legal amendment – to your Will. This can be organised with a phone call or email to your solicitor, followed by a visit to their office to sign the amendment and complete the codicil.
