## A win-win community partnership

corporate-style partnership with a local retirement village provider gave Ocean Grove Day VIEW Club (VIC) the financial assistance it needed to start sponsoring students in its first year. Heather Grant, President of the club is now urging other VIEW clubs to consider similar partnerships.

"Ryman Healthcare was looking for a new sponsorship within the Ocean Grove community and we were just starting up our VIEW club. We were both happy to develop a partnership," Heather explains.

Ocean Grove Day VIEW Club was formed in March 2020, just before the Coronavirus pandemic halted VIEW monthly meetings and fundraising activities. By October 2020, Ryman Healthcare and Ocean Grove Day VIEW had formalised a two-year partnership enabling sponsorship of the club's first two *Learning for Life* students. Members have since raised additional funds to sponsor two more students.

Janine Wilde, Sales Advisor for Ryman Healthcare Ocean Grove, was instrumental in setting up the partnership.

"Part of my role is to establish community partnerships. I was looking for something a bit different. When I started researching VIEW, I thought this is too good to be true," she says.

"Looking at what VIEW does in terms of education, it really appealed to me," Janine says. "I was also seeking a charity to be personally involved in. I've always been very passionate about giving back to the community, so this was the perfect match for me."

Janine says the partnership works on many levels. "VIEW gives me the opportunity to meet up with our demographic and also be part of an organisation that is all about family. We are also able to support a great cause," she says.

Club President Heather says other VIEW clubs can learn from her process.

"Janine and I came up with advantages for both organisations and saw how they matched up. Then we looked at what the commitment would be from both sides. For example, money, time and expertise from Ryman Healthcare. In return, we would display Ryman Healthcare banners at our meetings, use their logo in our newsletter and invite Ryman Healthcare speakers to meetings."

Ryman Healthcare also provides a prize in the club's monthly raffle and created a sponsorship target banner as a visible representation of fundraising efforts.

"The banner inspires our members to think about what we can do to raise funds for more students," Heather says. "I couldn't be happier with our partnership."

#### **New Oueensland** VIEW club

hen Dawn Potter was given a leaflet at her local shopping centre by women dressed in purple shirts, one sentence in the pamphlet struck a chord with her: "All money raised by us (VIEW) goes towards helping disadvantaged Australian children."

On arriving home, she immediately 'googled' VIEW Clubs of Australia. Inspired by what she learnt, Dawn was determined to start a VIEW club in her local area of Maryborough on the Fraser Coast of Oueensland.

Fourteen months later, and as Inaugural President, Dawn proudly opened Maryborough VIEW Club in November last year. The club is the first new VIEW Club in Queensland in 10 years and the fourth new VIEW Club to be opened nationally in 2020, the organisation's 60th year.

The inaugural meeting had 40 foundation members, guests from Gympie, Hervey Bay and Fraser Coast VIEW Clubs, members from the local community and The Smith Family.

Although the VIEW National Executive were unable to travel to Oueensland for the celebration. the new members were warmly welcomed to VIEW by The Smith Family's Queensland General Manager, Alan Le May. Local Councillors, Paul Truscott and Daniel Sanderson were also on hand to congratulate members, saying the

new VIEW Club would benefit the whole community. Other guests included Margaret Elliot, National Councillor: Jean Jennings, Zone Councillor; and past VIEW National Councillor Lyn Masters.

Leading in the VIEW tradition of guest speaker, Nancy Bates OAM, retired editor of the Fraser Coast Chronicle newspaper and local Maryborough entity, spoke about her work in a very male dominated business.

With the addition of Maryborough VIEW Club, There are now 38 clubs in Queensland with more than 2,508 members. Collectively, members sponsored 277 Learning for Life students and contributed more than \$300,000 in financial support to The Smith Family in 2020.
