Message from The Smith Family CEO

On behalf of The Smith Family, thank you! We are extremely grateful for all the fundraising, sponsoring and volunteering activities that you do to support disadvantaged Australian children and young people.



I am always delighted to hear about the special bond VIEW members develop with their sponsored students. One member recently expressed to me the deep satisfaction she feels when writing letters to her club's Learning for Life students and receiving their replies. She said hearing about a student's plans for their future is all the thanks her club needs to keep up their hard work supporting students.

Just to give you another sense of the individual impact sponsorship support can have, I want to share with you a letter I received a few weeks back. It was from a woman whom we had first supported 20 years ago after her husband died leaving her with two young boys. Her financial circumstances were further compounded when she developed breast cancer. She talked of the vital support we provided for her sons and in her words...

"I wish to heartily express my gratitude to those sponsors. I wondered at the time about the generosity of people who would take money out of their pockets and give it to unknown recipients in the hope that it may help to improve a child's chances in life."

In her letter, she thanked us for every excursion we had funded, every time we had mentored her boys, and every time we'd wrapped an arm of support around her. She went on to say that her sons are now grown men both working in nursing and "making their way in the world as confident, independent, kind and balanced human beings".

Stories and families like this inspire me every day. I take joy in knowing that we made such a difference in their lives ... and as a valued partner in our work, I know you do too.

On another note, you might have seen a new awareness campaign launched by the Community Council for Australia called It Takes A Village. The campaign encourages community members to be more actively involved in the educational journey of young people and to see education as everyone's business, not just the responsibility of parents and school staff. In Western Australia (WA)

Close to 200 guests attended West Coast VIEW Club's luncheon at Hillary's Yacht Club, while more than 100 members and their guests celebrated at the Marmion Angling and Aquatic Club with First WAVE Club.

At the West Coast VIEW event, Learning for Life student, Salome, who is studying a Bachelor of Arts degree at the University of Western Australia (UWA), spoke of how The Smith Family has supported her and her brother since primary school. "The Learning for Life program not only changes the student's life but the family's as well," Salome said. The Smith Family, General Manager for WA, Ian Moore, shared stories about the influential women in his life - his grandmother, his mother, and his wife - who have each inspired, influenced and pushed him to become a better person. The event's guest speaker was Caitlyn Fogarty, Executive Officer of the Fogarty Foundation, a sponsorship partner of The Smith Family providing extra financial support to gifted and talented students involved in the Learning for Life program.

At the First WAVE Club event, Learning for Life student, Jay, shared his story of growing up as an Aboriginal man supported by The Smith Family. Jay is in his second year at UWA. He is heavily involved in Aboriginal culture and mentoring younger people in his community. After giving a Welcome to Country in the Noongar language, Jay spoke about his life journey, his respect for his mother who raised him as a single parent, and the opportunities provided through the Learning for Life program. Other guest speakers were Maryanne Maher, VIEW's National Manager; Ian Moore from The Smith Family; Anne Banks-McAllister from the WA Local Government Association; and journalist and public speaker, Meri Fatin.

Three events were held for around 450 VIEW members and their guests. Victor Harbor VIEW Club partnered with the office of the Member for Finniss, David Basham, to host the Fleurieu Community Women's Awards. This breakfast event included special guests: John Teague, Member for Heysen; Georgina Downer, Liberal candidate for Mayo; Moira Jenkins, Mayor, City of Victor Harbor; Victoria McKirdy, CEO, City of Victor Harbor and guest speaker, Hon. Michelle Lensink, Minister for Human Resources. Five awards were presented to inspiring women involved in outstanding service in their community.

At The Port Club rooms, more than 150 VIEW members and their friends joined Dr Richard Harvey MP, Member for Newland. Guests were entertained by speakers Megan Hender, former Deputy Lord Major of Adelaide, and Victoria Purman, author, as well as talented 13-year-old Emilee, who sang and played guitar.
